- *Connect the dots:* Show exactly how the step-by-step mechanics you discussed in Block 2 play out in this real-world scenario.

Block 4: The 'So What?' (The 'Why')

Finish with a sharp evaluation. Why does this matter? What are the risks, compromises, or long-term consequences of the process you just described?
